

Concurrent Enrollment

QUICK GLANCE

1 Can The Student Be Admitted?

A high school junior and senior, the age of 16 or older, meeting the ACT/Pre-ACT composite score of 19 or SAT/PSAT score of 990 requirements or a GPA of 3.0 unweighted, may be admitted to CMN.

2 What Courses Can They Take?

To register in a college course, the student must meet the following score requirements in the subject area in which they are enrolling.

3 What Signatures Are Required?

High school principal or counselor must sign a concurrent consent form (cmn.edu/concurrent-consent) to certify the student attending is eligible to satisfy high school graduation requirements. A parent or legal guardian will also be required to sign, allowing the concurrent student permission to attend CMN. This will be required each term.

Concurrent students are considered college students even if they are under the age of 18, and as such are protected by Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). Student's information without written consent on file cannot be accessed (e.g. grades, attendance, contact with instructors, and balance information.) As part of our enrollment process, there is a FERPA consent form to be signed., allowing parents and legal guardians access to such information.

4 What Are The Costs?

The cost of tuition is \$146.50 per credit hour. CMN does not receive a state tuition waiver for high school students, however, Muscogee Creek and other federally recognized tribally enrolled students are eligible for the CMN scholarship or CMN tuition waivers. Concurrent students are not eligible for FAFSA.

Dropping a college course also requires communication with CMN because failure to do so may result in a financial obligation and potentially a failing grade on the student's official transcripts.

5 What Goes On The Transcript?

A student's college transcript is a permanent record. A student's grades impact their high school and college grade point averages (GPA), future financial aid eligibility, admission to institutions of higher education, and eligibility to continue concurrent college enrollment. Students must also maintain a 2.0 GPA to continue concurrent college enrollment.

For official transcript requests, visit cmn.edu/transcript to send to individuals. You will need an email address of the person receiving. This is at no cost to the student.

6 What Is A Student's Workload?

A concurrently enrolled student may register in a combined number of high school and college courses per term not to exceed 19 credit hours. For purposes of calculating workload, one-half high school unit equals three credit hours. Non-academic high school units are excluded from the workload calculation (e.g. office aid, athletics, choir, library aid). A concurrent student is considered full-time when enrolled in a minimum of 16 credit hours during the summer term. Regarding attendance, even if the high school is closed (school breaks, teacher-in-service, etc.), students will have to attend CMN as scheduled. An academic calendar will be provided.
